
Philip Preaches in Samaria




Beginning with the death of Stephen, a young man named Saul tried to destroy the church in Jerusalem. He went to the homes of the believers and dragged them off to prison.



Many of the believers in Jerusalem fled to other places in Judea and Samaria. But wherever they went, they preached the word of God.





For some time a man named Simon had practiced sorcery in that city. He amazed all the people of Samaria, and they called him "The Great Power."




When Philip arrived, he not only preached but performed miracles. Many people who had been crippled or had evil spirits were healed.



The people who heard Philip preach the good news about Jesus Christ believed and were baptized.




In fact, even Simon himself believed and was baptized. He followed Philip around everywhere, astonished by the great miracles which Philip performed.



The apostles in Jerusalem heard that people in Samaria had accepted the word of God. So they sent Peter and John to them.




