
## The Conversion of Saul

Obtaining this authority, Saul went to Damascus. But when he got near the city, a light from heaven suddenly flashed around him.






"Get up and go into the city," the Lord said. "You will be told what you must do." Now the men who were with Saul heard the sound, but they saw no one. They stood there speechless.




When Saul got up from the ground, he could not see. He had to be led by the hand into Damascus. For the next three days, he was blind. He neither ate nor drank anything.




In Damascus, there was a disciple named Ananias. The Lord called to him in a vision, "Ananias!" "Yes, Lord," he answered.




Ananias replied, "But Lord, I have heard about all the harm this man has done to the believers in Jerusalem. He has come here with authority to arrest all who call on your name."




