


Paul Before Festus and Agrippa



About two weeks after Festus replaced Felix as governor, Paul's enemies presented their case against Paul to Festus. They made many charges which they could not prove.




Paul defended himself by saying, "I have done nothing wrong against the law of the Jews or against the temple or against Caesar."

After Festus talked this over with his council, he said, "You have appealed to Caesar. To Caesar you will go!"






So the next day Festus brought Paul in before Agrippa and Bernice and all the important men of the city. Agrippa gave Paul permission to speak.




Paul said, "I am only saying what the prophets predicted—that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead and proclaim light to the Jews and Gentiles."
