
## **Jacob Gets Two Wives**



Because of Esau's anger, Jacob had been sent to Haran, where he lived with his uncle, Laban.




Laban had two daughters. Rachel, the younger daughter, was more beautiful than Leah, the older one. Jacob soon fell in love with Rachel.




Laban offered to pay Jacob to work for him, but Jacob said, "I will work seven years for you if you will let me marry Rachel."




Laban agreed, so Jacob worked for him for a full seven years. But the time seemed like only a few days to him because of his love for Rachel.






When Jacob complained, Laban said, "It is not our custom to let the younger daughter marry before the older. But I will give you Rachel now if you will work for me for another seven years."
