


In the Beginning




The very first story in the Bible tells how God made the world and everything in it. "In the beginning God made the heavens and earth."

God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. Then God separated the light and the dark. He called the light "day" and the dark "night." This was what God did on the first day.




Next God separated the waters and put a space between them. God called this space the "sky." This was the second day.



On the third day God caused the waters to be gathered so that dry ground would appear. God called the dry ground "land" and he called the gathered waters "seas."




That same day God said, "Let the land be filled with trees and plants," and it was. All the plants made seeds, and all the trees had fruit with seeds so that there would always be plants and trees.
