All the sons left for Egypt except Benjamin, the youngest. Jacob was afraid something might happen to him as it had to Joseph years ago.






Joseph recognized them instantly, but they did not know him. Joseph decided to test his brothers. "You are spies!" he charged.




"Sir," they responded, "we are not spies. We are all brothers, and our father is in Canaan. Our youngest brother is there, and one of our brothers is dead."
