
The Israelites Become Slaves




A long time had passed since the family of Jacob moved to Egypt. Joseph and his brothers and all the people living then were now dead. But their descendants had become very numerous.


So Pharaoh made a plan to keep the Israelites from growing in numbers. He decided he would make slaves of the Israelites and crush their spirits with hard labor.


God was pleased with the midwives for not obeying Pharaoh's orders to kill the babies, and he blessed them with families of their own. The Israelites continued to grow in numbers.
