


Moses Flees to Midian




One day Moses saw an Egyptian beat a Hebrew, one of his own people.




Moses looked all around. When he saw that no one was looking, he killed the Egyptian and hid the body in the sand.




The next day Moses went back to the area where the Hebrews were living. This time he saw two Hebrews fighting with each other. He tried to stop the fight.






