
God Provides for His People




After the Lord rescued them from the Egyptians, the Israelites traveled on into the desert of Shur. For three days they could find no water at all.

The Israelites named this food "manna." Moses said, "This is the food that the Lord has given you. Gather two quarts for each member of your family. But don't keep any overnight."




Some people paid no attention and saved part of it. In the morning it was full of worms and smelled rotten. From then on, they gathered only what they needed. The rest melted in the sun.
