
The Israelites Enter Canaan




The very next morning after the two spies returned, Joshua had the people of Israel move their camp to a place beside the Jordan River. There they waited to cross the river.

The leaders went through the camp telling the people that when the priests with the Covenant Box moved, they were to follow at a distance of about half a mile. Then Joshua told the priests to start out.





After all the people were safe, Joshua told the priests with the Covenant Box to come out of the riverbed. As soon as they did, the waters began to flow and the river flooded its banks again!






News of how the Lord had dried up the Jordan so the people of Israel could cross it reached all the kings in Canaan, and they were afraid of the Israelites.
