
Ruth Is Loyal




In the days when Israel was still ruled by judges

An Israelite named Elimelech, who lived in Bethlehem of Judah, decided to take his wife and two sons and live for a while in the land of Moab, where there was food.




While living in Moab, Elimelech died. Naomi was left alone with her two sons. After a time, the sons married Moabite girls named Orpah and Ruth.

But Naomi said, "I am too old to have other sons for you to marry. You must go home."




Again they started crying. Then Orpah kissed her mother-in-law and went back to the home of her parents. Ruth, however, kept holding onto Naomi.
