When the Philistines found out that Samson had done this because his father-in-law had given his wife to a friend, the Philistines went and burned Samson's wife and her father to death.




Later Samson tried to visit his wife, but her father said, "I thought you hated her, so I gave her to your friend. Her younger sister is prettier anyway. You can have her instead."


