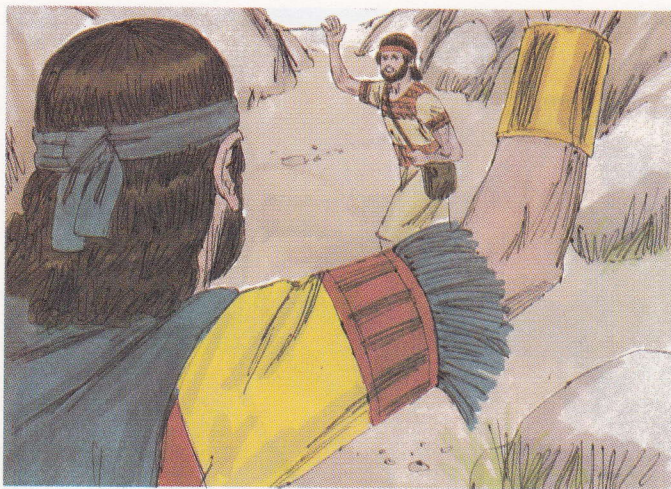


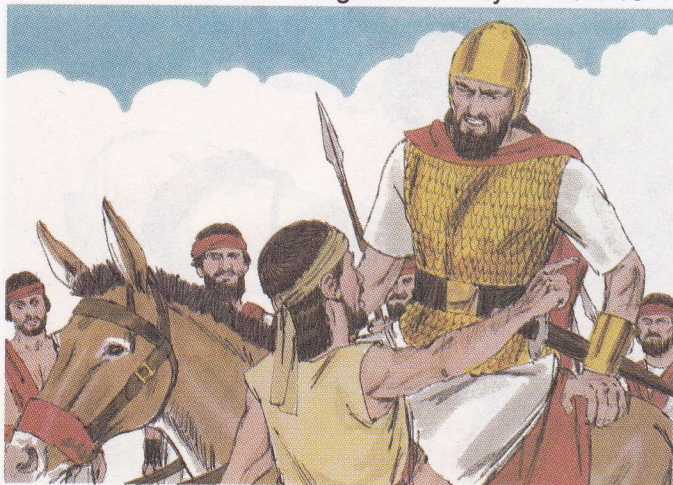
Saul Chases David



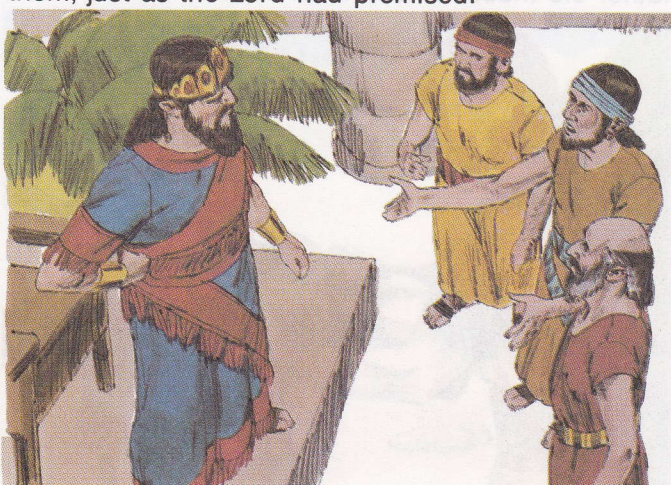

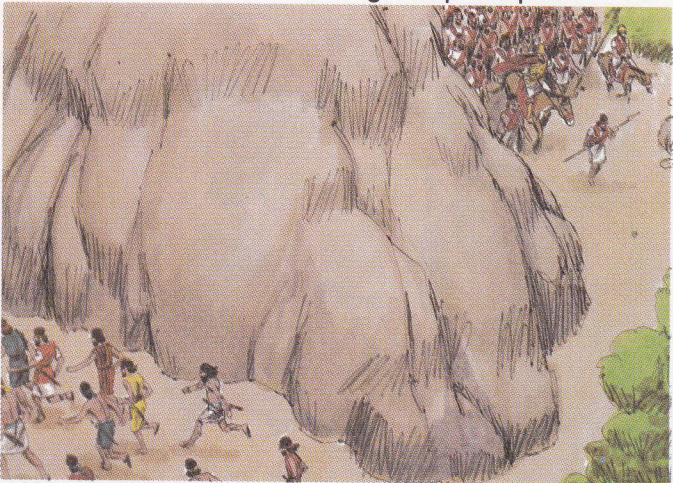
2 David asked the Lord whether he should try to save the town, and the answer was yes. So he and his men attacked the Philistines and defeated them, just as the Lord had promised.



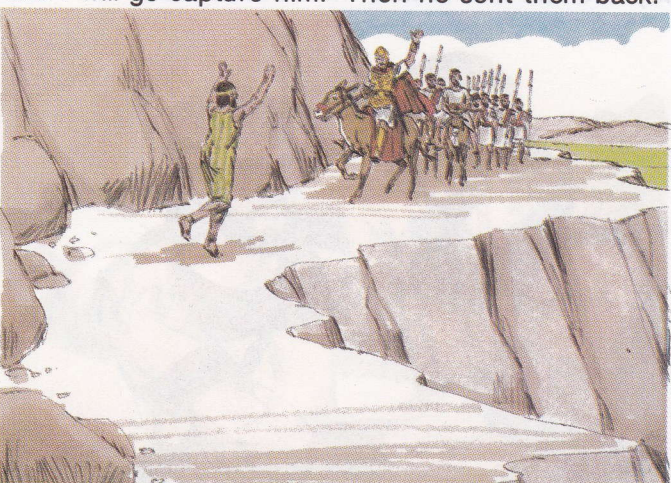

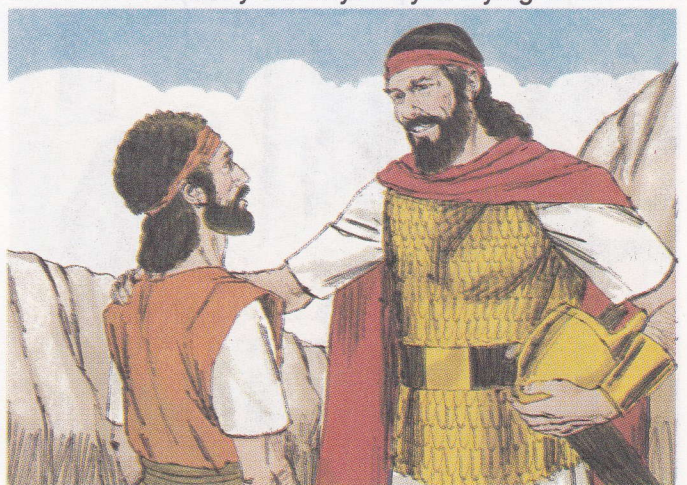
9 But David did not harm Saul. Instead he slipped up close to the king in the darkness and cut off a piece of his robe. Saul did not know that anything at all had happened.
