


Abram Leaves His Home


When Abram got to Canaan, he camped at a place called Shechem. There God appeared to Abram, saying, "This is the land I am going to give you and your children."





When the king figured out what had happened, he told Abram to take Sarai and go away. The king's men took Abram and his wife and sent them out of Egypt.




