
Esther Becomes Queen


For a full year the girls were given a special beauty treatment. Then they were presented to the king. Xerxes liked Esther more than all the others and chose her to be his new queen.




During that year Mordecai got a job in the palace. One day he happened to overhear a plot: two of the palace guards planned to kill the king. He told Esther, and she told the king.

About five years after Esther became queen of Persia, the Jews of that land faced a great danger. It all began when a man named Haman received a promotion from the king.




The other servants asked Mordecai why he did not obey the king. The only explanation he ever gave them was that he was a Jew. Every day they tried to get him to bow down before Haman.
